SALIENT FEATURES OF THE RESEARCH WORK :

Through the scope of this thesis, I shall be presenting how the defining features of science fiction generally located on the "In-Front-of-Us", at the level of the "Not-Yet-Being", and within the dimension of utopian futurity assist mankind towards progress. In this process man himself continues to be rigorously questioned by the cosmic rational order of the universe, which in itself is paradoxical as it is never completely realized in the here-and-now. The narratives of Isaac Asimov (in particular), Arthur C. Clarke and Gene Wolfe have interrogated the lacuna, the banal and the corrupt barriers of our status quo, and have satisfactorily filled it by investigating the nature of the human *self* and its *other* – the machines and the other non-human forms of life. The thesis progresses towards identifying man's deepest and radical longings, which in order to be satisfied demands an extensive and absolute reconfiguration of the world as a *totality*. The dissertation hopes to offer proof that the genre of science fiction is characterized by the introduction of a basic novelty that gradually reconstitutes the surrounding world and creates a new world.
