



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


As part of the three-month certificate program, the Centre for Scottish Studies organised a series of lectures featuring Prof. (Dr.) Amrit Sen, Professor in the Deaprtment of English at Visva Bharati University and Prof. (Dr.) Deb Narayan Bandyopadhyay, Chief Executive Director (Academics) at Swami Vivekananda University and Former Founding Vice Chancellor of Bankura University. The sessions provided enriching perspectives on Scotland's cultural and literary heritage, fostering critical engagement and broadening students' understanding of its global significance. Through these scholarly interactions, the Centre strengthened its commitment to promoting dialogue and reflection on Scotland's diverse literary and cultural traditions.
